Dear Majority Leader McConnell, Minority Leader Reid, Majority Leader McCarthy and Minority Leader Pelosi:

This morning, a World Trade Organization (WTO) arbitrator ruled that Canada and Mexico can impose retaliatory tariffs of slightly more than \$1 billion on imported U.S. goods because of damages caused by the mandatory U.S. Country-of-Origin-Labeling (COOL) rule for meat. On June 10, 2015, the House of Representatives passed legislation, H.R. 2393, *the Country-of-Origin-Labeling Amendments Act of 2015*, of which I was the lead Democrat sponsor, which would modify the Agricultural Marketing Act of 1946 to repeal COOL requirements for beef, pork and chicken. As the omnibus appropriations bill is being negotiated, I strongly urge the inclusion of this language so that we can resolve this issue once and for all and prevent the heavy hammer of trade retaliations being leveled on Americans farmers, ranchers, dairy producers and manufactures.

All Americans – not just those involved in agriculture and manufacturing –will feel economic damages if COOL is not fixed in the omnibus appropriations bill and retaliatory tariffs are allowed to take effect. The U.S. needs to take action to prevent the implementation of these retaliatory tariffs before they do irreparable damage to distinct industries and impact the overall economy.

Finally, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS), which enforces COOL, has said repeatedly that "[t]he COOL program is neither a food safety or traceability program, but rather a consumer information program." Since its implementation, our livestock markets have been faced with major costs and little benefit. Additionally, the USDA released an economic impact analysis to Congress (as mandated by the 2014 Farm Bill) that said that consumers will, over the long run, face higher beef and pork prices and producers will not see any economic benefit as a result of COOL requirements.
